Board proposes 2025-26 school budget with a 2.95% tax levy increase

On Tuesday, May 20, residents of the Avoca Central School District will go to the polls to decide on a \$14,562,895 proposed budget for the 2025-26 school year. Polls are open from noon to 8 p.m. at the Avoca School Bus Garage.

The proposal carries a 2.95% tax levy increase, which is once again below the district's maximum allowable levy limit of 3.73%, as set by the state, and aligned with the Consumer Price Index, which is measured by inflation rates.

Overall spending in the proposed budget will increase by \$976,642, or 7.19%. A large portion of this increase in year-to-year expenses can be attributed to a significant increase in anticipated health insurance costs and an increase in structured debt associated with the voter-approved 2023 capital project. The increase in structured



debt, however, is ultimately offset by NYS building aid and the use of reserves.

"For many years, we were able to propose budgets to residents that maintained programming and staffing while carrying a zero percent tax levy increase," explains Business Administrator Matthew Pfleegor. "The last few years, the district, like everyone else, has been impacted by the effects of higher inflation rates."

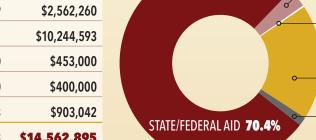
Avoca experienced a rise in costs for health insurance, energy, interest on capital project borrowing, and supplies—everything from classroom and instructional materials to cleaning supplies. Yet, with strategic planning and mindful reductions in certain areas of the budget, the board is able to propose a budget that remains below the tax cap, while maintaining support services and academic programming for students.

Superintendent Stephen Saxton describes the budget process as a balancing act, requiring careful consideration of community resources. "Ultimately, this budget reinforces our core mission: a collaborative effort among parents, teachers, community members, and school leaders who are committed to providing Avoca students with a high-quality, well-rounded education that not only prepares them for future academic pursuits or careers but also empowers them to become engaged and contributing members of society. It's the education they deserve, and it's the foundation for their future success."

2025-26 THREE-PART BUDGET SUMMARY

New York law requires school districts to present their budgets divided into three expenditure components-program, administrative and capital-and compare them to the previous year's costs. Avoca's three-part budget is as follows:

PROGRAM

2025-25 \$10,503,908 / 72.2% OF BUDGET

2024-25 \$9,873,206 / 72.7% OF BUDGET

Provides for instructional and educational support services for the district's students including teacher salaries, benefits, supplies, BOCES services, interscholastic athletics and transportation.

ADMINISTRATIVE

2025-26 \$1,606,36<u>6</u> / 11% OF BUDGET

\$1,632,858 / 12% OF BUDGET

Provides for overall general support and management activities, including business office operations, payroll, purchasing, general administration, personnel, legal and auditing services.

CAPITAL

Provides for all operations and maintenance department salaries, benefits, supplies, utilities and all other expenses for the operation of the facilities. Expenses for debt service (capital project loans) are included in this component.

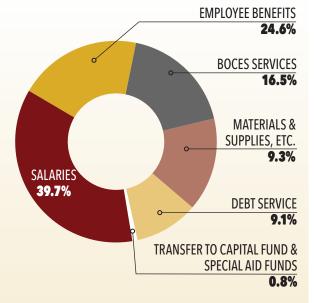
ESTIMATED TAX IMPACT OF 2.95% LEVY INCREASE

Based on current equalization rates and assessments, a home with a fair market value of \$100,000 would pay an estimated \$897 in school taxes (before applicable STAR exemption). This would represent an increase of approximately \$26 over the current year.

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Absentee & Early Mail Voting Ballots Available for Qualified Residents

Voters who are unable to vote in person on May 20 may apply for an absentee ballot. Voters who would prefer to vote by mail rather than in person may apply for an early mail voting ballot.

Qualified voters must submit an application in order to be eligible to receive either an absentee or early mail voting ballot. Both applications are available at the District Office.

Early mail voting ballots will be provided to any qualified voter who would prefer to mail their ballot rather than vote in person on Tuesday, May 20. Absentee ballots will be provided to qualified voters who will be unable to vote in person due to: illness or physical disability, hospitalization, incarceration (unless incarcerated for a felony), traveling outside the voter's county or city of residence for employment or business reasons, studies, or vacation on the day of the election.

Voters may only apply for an early mail voting ballot on their own behalf. A voter who applies for and is issued an early mail voting ballot will not be eligible for an absentee ballot for the same election.

The district clerk must receive either application at least seven days (May 13) before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or one day prior to the vote, if in person.

Proposition 2: Purchase of 3 school vehicles

Also on the May 20 ballot, voters will decide on a proposition to purchase two clean diesel school buses and a passenger vehicle at a maximum cost of \$420,000. The district would use the existing Transportation Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund to pay for the vehicles in full, at the time of purchase. The district relies on a five-year replacement plan to guide its bus propositions. The proposed bus purchases come with a five-year warranty and the commitment to trade at the end of that term. The market for school buses in good condition, with relatively low mileage, is strong and fiscally beneficial. Five-year replacement plans help ensure safe and reliable transportation for all students each year and represent a significant savings in maintenance costs.

CAPITAL OUTLAY EXCEPTION PROJECT

Within the 2025-26 general fund budget, there is an appropriation of \$100,000 to fund water drainage remediation on the softball field and to complete a variety of interior building renovations such as replacement of display cases and toilet partitions as well as work associated with interior finishes. Additionally, the district will be reimbursed for 90 percent of the costs for these improvement costs through New York state building aid.
